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A history of peculiarities





Castles and chateaus are also the right place to go for sensation hunters. Who would expect to find the head of a mammoth at Lednice Castle, an inscribed UNESCO site? Do you think the only place for

human bones is in a grave? Think again. The charnel house at Kutná Hora will set you straight - chandeliers, candelabras, and even the monstrance are made of human bones and skulls. Not to be outdone, the chateau at Kunštát has a unique cemetery for dogs. And if you thought counterfeit money was only a scourge of the modern day, take a trip to the ruins of Křídlo Castle. If you're lucky, you might find coins forged by the owner of the estate back in the 15th century. If you go to Mikulov, don't miss the giant wine cask from 1643, built to hold 1,010 hl of wine.



Stars of the silver screen

Film buffs can relive the adventures of their favourite film stars, because many castles and chateaus have been the setting for a number of Czech movies. especially fairy tales.



Recently, Hollywood crews have increasingly been coming to the Czech Republic to shoot their films (Bouzov, Hrubá Skála, Zbiroh, Krakovec, Klokočín, Vranov nad Dyjí, Červená Lhota, Roztěž).

Gourmets





you can at least find out how they distilled plum brandy at Vizovice, see how they cooked two centuries ago at Zbiroh, where the kitchen and its curious equipment has been preserved, or taste true sacramental wine from the Archbishop's cellars in Kroměříž.

CASTLES AND CHATEAUS

Castles and chateaus primarily bear witness to how good a memory we have and to centuries of cultural tradition, but they are much more than places where all life and fun has disappeared under layers of dust accumulated over past centuries. They are not just an excuse for boring numbers, dates, and strange-sounding names of long extinct noble families. Castles and chateaus can still be a source of entertainment, adventure, romance, and suspense. Everyone can find something to interest them and they don't have to be history buffs.

Besides the world-famous sites which are practically compulsory stops on any tour of the Czech Republic. such as Karlštejn, Konopiště, Hluboká, and Český Krumlov, there are dozens of lesser known castles and chateaus which, although not so famous, can match the above-mentioned sites in impressiveness and originality.



Places of dreams and romance

For many of us, castles and chateaus are primarily places of romance, dreams, and mystery. It is just as easy to succumb to the enchantment of luxury palaces with gorgeous interiors well-tended gardens (Hluboká, Lednice, Konopiště, Kroměříž) as it is to be captivated by the rugged beauty of the ruins of medieval castles which, over



the centuries, have suffered from the ravages of time, fires, or enemy troops (Hukvaldy, Rabí, Točník, Trosky). Visitors are quick to daydream, imagining inhabitants long gone, their everyday joys and woes, and the great dramas of love and hate which once unfurled in the ancient walls around them.

Places of fateful encounters






Many castles and chateaus offer the betrothed who want to enjoy their special day in a romantic place the opportunity of holding their wedding in a palatial hall or castle chapel (Sychrov, Bečov, Vizovice, Lipnice nad

Sázavou Hukvaldy, Častolovice, Hluboká, Hrubý Rohozec). Unattached girls might lose their hearts to a handsome man among the swordsmen who invest their enthusiasm and determination into reviving the glory of ancient jousting and other chivalrous tournaments at many castles (Bouzov, Náchod, Lipnice nad Sázavou).



Memories of battles long gone

Medieval knights in shining armour are not the only attraction. Reconstructions of battles and military skirmishes from the time of the Baroque and the Napoleonic Wars are also a big crowd-paller.



Many castles were the sites of famous battles that had a fundamental influence on Czech and European history (Austerlitz, Rabí, Hrádek u Nechanic, Horažďovice). The ingenious systems of defence and fortification that can be found at castles and Baroque strongholds (Hukvaldy, Rabí, Pernštejn, Kaceřov, Josefov) also deserve our attention and admiration.

Places of tales and legends





Want to send shivers down your spine? Then visit some of the mysterious sites immersed in strange tales and legends. There are plenty of them - try Sychrov, Zvíkov, or Radaně, which by all accounts are still haunted. Your blood will curdle

in your veins when you hear about the burning of witches (Velké Losiny) or see a reconstruction of an execution (Bečov) or torture (Sychrov). Want more? Well, go meet the ghosts on a night time tour (Sychrov, Bečov, Kynžvart, Náchod). You can also go on a guest for treasure (Potštejn, Trosky, Kašperk) or look for secret corridors (Grabštejn, Benešov nad Ploučnicí, Pernštein).



Tourists thirsty for culture should set off on the trail of painters, sculptors, and architects whose magnificent works can be admired at many sites as permanent fixtures of original chambers and halls (Kuks, Roudnice nad Labem, Bečov, Kroměříž, Telč, Karlova Koruna, Plasy). Music lovers and avid theatregoers are sure to appreciate



the cultural festivals that take place at many castles, especially in the summer months (Bechyně, Hrádek u Nechanic, Český Šternberk, Bouzov, Náchod, Český Krumlov, Kutná Hora).

Places of unique collections





The more inquisitive tourists should pay a visit to castles and chateaus offering exhibitions of museum collections (Kámen, Rabí, Lipnice, Kynžvart, Nebílovy, Častolovice, Jánský Vrch, Nové Město nad Metují, Nový

Jičín, Strážnice). Those who prefer machinery and technology to pictures and statues won't be disappointed either. Many castles and chateaus have rare technical artefacts and interesting historical machines and equipment (Jilemnice, Humprecht, Bechyně, Kutná Hora-Hrádek, Most, Plasy, Zákupy).



Places in the heart of nature

Nature lovers can enjoy the centuries-old trees and other rare exotic trees and shrubs often found in castle gardens (Kroměříž, Sychrov, Průhonice, Roztěž, Slatiňany). Are you fond of animals? Well, Czech castles and chateaus have something to offer animal-lovers too. Besides the bears which



guard several Czech castles (Konopiště, Český Krumlov, Točník), the zoos at some castles look after much more exotic animals (Vrchlabí Monastery, Lednice, Kroměříž). At Slatiňany, you can admire the graceful curves of Kladruby and Przewalski horses and take in an exhibition of horse history containing 2,100 artefacts.
